In accordance with this court's previous Supplemental Order In Aid of Case Administration filed July 24, 1991 and Amended Supplemental Order in Aid of Case Administration filed May 14, 1992, effective August 1, 1994, bankruptcy cases (and related adversary proceedings) referred to the United States Bankruptcy Judges for the Western District of North Carolina by the United States District Court are assigned and allocated as follows:

JUDGES HODGES

Charlotte: - Previously assigned Charlotte Chapter 11 cases, and any new cases randomly assigned;

Asheville: - All cases, all Chapters

and any and all specially assigned cases under any Chapter at any location.

JUDGE WHITLEY

Charlotte: - All Chapter 13 cases;
- All Chapter 12 cases previously assigned to Judge Wooten;
- All Chapter 11 cases previously assigned to Judge Wooten and any new cases randomly assigned;

Statesville: - All cases, all Chapters

and any and all specially assigned cases under any Chapter at any location.

JUDGE WOOTEN

Charlotte: - All Chapter 7 cases;

Shelby: - All cases, all Chapters

and any and all specially assigned cases under any Chapter at any location.

Adversary proceedings are assigned to the judge who is responsible for the base case. Adversary proceedings may be reassigned in the court's discretion. In such event the parties will be notified of the reassignment.

In order to facilitate the smooth flow of court business, to provide for judicial services in the absence of the assigned judge, and to provide for such services on an emergency basis the undersigned have concluded it to be proper, appropriate and in the best interest of timely service, efficient case administration and justice to enter the following:


It is ORDERED, ADJUDGED and DECREED that:

1. The judge to whom as case is assigned shall have full control and responsibility for the complete administration of such case;
2. The judge to whom a case is assigned shall designate another judge to act in such case, as such other judge in his discretion deems appropriate, from time to time; and
3. The judges hereby assign to each other full power and authority to conduct the court of the others as they agree without further order.
